Young children experience separation anxiety and development regression when their parents are incarceration. Research report, on parent-child separation (*Johnston*, 1995) on prevention of intergenerational offending found the following progression:

Parent-Child Separation


- 2-6 years: Separation anxiety, developmental regression, impaired development of initiative
- 7-10 years: Developmental regression and poor self-concept
- 11-14 years: Child rejecting the limits of behaviours
- 15-18 years: Early termination of the dependency relationship between parent and child

Parental incarceration is associated with numerous other adverse childhood experiences, 2011-12


